The Fund's objective is to achieve a total return greater than that of the NSCI (XIC) over the long term by investing in a diversified portfolio of small UK quoted companies.


## **Investment style: Value**

# Monthly investment commentary: October

Global equities rebounded from September's weakness, aided by the generally favourable quarterly earnings season in the US. Supply chain bottlenecks and rising consumer prices continued to be salient themes across the globe. The oil price surged to the highest level since 2018, while growing expectations of interest rate rises was evident in the upward movement of short-dated bonds during the month. Against this macro backdrop, the FTSE All-Share (+1.8%) led the NSCI (XIC) (-0.5%), helped by higher exposure to Energy and Financials.

The Fund was down by 1.3% for the month. Its bias towards smaller small companies was a gentle headwind, while style had no meaningful impact. The continued cyclical recovery across industries was evident in the winners, which included **Robert Walters** (recruitment), **Provident Financial** (specialty lender) and **SIG** (building products distributor). In the case of **FirstGroup** (bus & rail operator), a proposed tender offer following the disposal of the US business was received well by the market.


Stocks that hurt relative performance were less thematic in nature. **Reach** (news publisher) gave back some of the previous months' gains, while poor sentiment for **International Personal Finance** (specialty lender) may have been affected by Poland's weakening relationship with the EU. Finally, the surge in UK M&A continued, with the approach for Playtech (gambling software developer) by Aristocrat Leisure, the Australian gaming company.

The Fund has a bank debt facility of £130m available for use as gearing by the Manager at any time. The net gearing/(liquidity) figure shown in the Key Fund information section indicates the percentage by which the total value of investments exceeds the total net assets.

The continuation of the Fund is voted on by shareholders at every  $3^{\circ l}$  AGM. The next vote will occur at the AGM in March 2023.


